Free Class on Utah Archaeology

How long have people lived in Utah? What is an atlatl? Is it true there is a 1,000-year-old Fremont village under the streets of Salt Lake City?

Those who have ever had a question about the archaeology of Utah can satisfy their curiosity at a free one-day course. The class on Utah archaeology will be taught by staff of the Antiquities Section of State History. It will be held on Saturday, October 14, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., at the Rio Grande Depot, 300 S. Rio Grande Street, Salt Lake City.

The course will cover:

- The archaeological resources of Utah
- The prehistoric cultures of Utah
- Protection of archaeological sites
- How individuals can get involved in archaeology
- A behind-the-scenes tour of the state archaeology lab
